Sixties Sedans Mk1, Mk2, S-Type, 420, MkX and 420G



The Jaguar Mark 1 was a British saloon car produced by Jaguar between 1955 and 1959. It was referred to in contemporary company documentation as the Jaguar compact sedan 2.4 Litre and 3.4 Litre. Its designation as Mark 1 was retroactive, following its October 1959 replacement by Jaguar's Mark 2 compact sedan. Back when motorways in the UK had no speed limits, the Mark 2 Jaguar was the vehicle of choice for the bobby. And for good rea-

son. One of the fastest four-door sedans available at the time, the Mark 2 Jaguar offered everything an aspiring bank robber could ever want from a getaway car, masses of space for loot, and the pace to evade capture. Opting for 3.8-liter machines, 266 cars were bought by the Metropolitan police for inner-city use and most famously TV's Inspector Morse in Oxford.

In 1961 Jaguar launched the full size Jaguar Mark X which used Jaguar's new independent rear sus-

pension and a triple SU carburettor version of the 3.8-litre XK engine; upgraded to 4.2 litre in 1964.

Having released the Mark X with its many technical refinements, Sir William Lyons expected the Mark 2 would need updating with similar features if



it was to retain its place in the market. Accordingly, work began on developing the S-Type as soon as development work was finished on the Mark X. The S-Type was a major redevelopment of the Mark 2. It used a mid-scale version of the Mark X independent rear suspension to replace the Mark 2's live rear axle and featured longer rear bodywork, among other styling and interior changes. The S-Type was available with either 3.4 or 3.8-litre XK engines but only in twin carburettor form because the triple carburettor setup would not fit into what was essentially still the Mark 2 engine bay.

By the time of the S-Type's release in 1963, the Mark 2 remained an unexpectedly strong seller de-

spite its age. Although the Mark X was selling less well than hoped, especially in its intended market of the U.S., Sir William decided to retain all three models in the Jaguar range concurrently. The Mark X was renamed "420G" in 1966 and was joined by another new model, the 4.2-litre 420. The 420 was developed to replace the S-Type but because some demand remained for the S-Type, all four saloon models (Mark 2, S-Type, 420 and 420G) remained on sale until the arrival of the Jaguar XJ6 in 1968.



Classic XJ Range Series 1,2,3 and XJC

The XJ6, using the 2.8Land 4.2L straight-six cylinder versions of Jaguar's renowned XK engine replaced most of Jaguar's saloons which had expanded to four separate ranges. Additionally an upmarket version was marketed under the Daimler brand as the Daimler Sovereign.

The car was introduced in September 1968 with power-assisted steering and leather upholstery as standard on the 2.8 L De Luxe and 4.2 L models. Air conditioning was offered as an optional extra on the Daimler version. Preliminary reviews of the car were favourable, noting the effective brakes and good ride quality. In a series of television advertisements featuring Sir William, he referred to the car as "the finest Jaguar ever".

In March 1970 the automatic transmission was updated which effectively enabled performance oriented drivers to hold lower ratios at higher revs to achieve better acceleration. Around this time other, minor changes were made such as moving the rear reflectors from beside to below the rear lights and on the interior the chrome gauge bezels were replaced with black ones, to cut down on distracting reflections.

In 1972, the option of a long-wheelbase version, providing a 4-inch increase in leg room for passengers on the rear seats, became available.

A high performance version called the XJ12 was announced in July 1972 powered by a Jaguar's 5.3 L V12 engine coupled to the Borg-Warner Model 12 transmission. At the time it was the only mass-produced 12-cylinder, four-door car in the world and, with a top speed of "around" 225 km/h (140 mph), it was the "fastest full four-seater available in the world".

Although it had been the manufacturer's intention from launch that the XJ would use the 12-cylinder engine its installation was nonetheless a tight fit, and providing adequate cooling had been a challenge for Jaguar's engineers.

The XJC Jaguar is a two door Coupe version of Jaguar's very successful XJ Series 2 saloons. It was produced from 1974 to 1978 and only a relatively small number were built, especially V12's, which makes it a very rare and collectible classic car today.



Classic GT XJ-S

The XJ-S was introduced in 1975 as the replacement for the E-type, which had reached the ultimate stage of its refinement in Series 3 form. A hard top coupe design was chosen because of anticipated American safety legislation banning soft tops. The mechanics of the car were based on the proven XJ saloon, and the fuel injected 5.3 litre V12 engine.

Body design was by William Lyons and Malcolm Sayer. The new car's shape met with a mixed reception. Many enthusiasts expected something more sporting in appearance like the E-type and refused to acknowledge it as a true Jaguar. However, the car had performance equal to the E-type and the comfort and handling of the XJ saloon. Despite the misgivings, the model became popular and remained in production until 1996.

There were ongoing improvements and variations during the 21 years period. In 1981, the H.E. (high efficiency) version of the V12 engine with cylinder head designed by Michael May provided improved fuel economy. In 1983, a 3.6 litre 6 cylinders AJ6 engine option became available. This was upgraded to 4.0 litre in 1991.

An XJ-SC (cabriolet) version was introduced in 1985. This model had a fixed skeleton roof structure including a cross over member akin to a rollbar covered by a fold down fabric roof. A full convertible became available from 1989.

The XJR-S V12 with 6 litre engine was introduced in 1993.

Borg Warner automatic gearbox was most popular over the whole period of production, but a number were fitted with a five speed manual.



Modern Saloons XJ40, X300, X308, X350, X351

By the mid nineteen eighties, the design of the XJ series was looking a bit old and the XK engine with its steel block very heavy. It was time for a total review.

After a long period of design and prototype testing the new XJ was released in 1986. The model was code-named XJ40 and that name was adopted by the public. It sold strongly though its fashionable squarish lines were not loved by Jaguar traditionalists. The aluminium engine was called AJ6 for Advanced Jaguar six-cylinder and came as 2.9 or 3.6 litre. By 1991 the 2.9 grew to 3.2 litre and the 3.6 grew to 4.0 litre. Following some redesign of the engine bay, the V12 option became available from 1991. There was a base model plus upmarket Sovereign and Daimler versions. Transmission was either 5-speed Getrag manual or 4-speed ZF automatic.

From late 1994 the model code-named X300 superseded the XJ40. This model appeased the traditionalists by having subtly curved body panels. Six-cylinder engines were improved and now termed AJ16. The V12 engine had grown to 6 litres. The range now included a model called Sport and a supercharged version called the XJR.

The next Jaguar modern saloon model was announced in 1997. While the exterior appearance had only subtle changes, the dash was modernised and most notably engines were now all AJ V8 in either 3.2 or 4.0 litres. This model was code-named X308. The XJR version was now a supercharged V8.

A radical change in body fabrication was introduced in 2003 for the next saloon, codenamed X350. Superficially the car looked like the X308, but taller. The change was the new aluminium monocoque body structure held together by an adhesive and thousands of special rivets. This model was available as an XJ6 with a V6 engine and an XJ8 with V8 in 3.5 or 4.2 litre, the latter with option of supercharger. All had 6-speed ZF automatic transmission.



The heritage steam train, our trip for May 2022, has been included in "Best of Qld Experiences" program for 2022. It also gained a starring role in the UK Channel 5's massively popular "World's Most Scenic Journeys". As well it received a high profile in the Bill Nighy narrated documentary "Along the Queensland Coast".
