COVID lockdowns unfortunately cancelled our traditional last Sunday in August date and there were concerns that by October, with the weather warming up, it might make conditions uncomfortable for us. However, we were blessed with a milder day and with the rain a few days beforehand, the paddock was greening up and dust levels were

Time passes so very quickly. How do I know?

I can still remember the first drive a group of E-type owners made 10 years ago when Neil and Jenny Summerson offered their Peak Crossing property as a breakfast venue. From this came the annual multi marque charity event now known as A Day in the Country.









Neil went to his insurers and asked if his insurance would include cover for around 200 cars, some of eye watering value and around 400 people to gather on the property on

the last Sunday in August and raise some money for charity. In a quote from "The Castle", the person Neil was speaking to said "You have to be

At the next Fassifern Valley Rotary Club meeting, Neil was telling some Rotary members about the telephone exchange and a Rotary person said, if Rotary was the charity, then you would be covered by Rotary International insurance.



This started the journey to where we are today.

Neil and I are the organising committee. Our support are our wives Jenny and Gail and on the day, many friends assist us doing all the jobs needed, not to mention the musical and photographic talents.

We tried and were successful this year in limiting the number of vehicles that could display on the day, as the event was just getting too big. We can now report 162 vehicles attending with values from \$1,000 to many millions and just under 300 people from 16 invited car clubs raised \$7,260 for the Fassifern Valley Rotary Club. This is to be used in the Fassifern Valley area to assist families financially affected by

Also \$1,850 was raised from a silent auction of a Crown wood stove that took 10 years to restore by Wasyl Malar Wasyl, a Vietnam veteran who felt sympathy with a Peak Crossing charity, 4 Aussie Heroes supported by this event a few years ago. He decided to assist this year by putting up his beloved wood stove for silent auction. 4 Aussie Heros is a private foundation assisting first responders with mental

Neil and I are not getting any younger and we have discussed that maybe this might be our last year of creating this event. Neil told the Fassifern Valley Rotary Club at the start not to put the takings from this day into their budget, but this year's president said in his thank you speech, that this event was the largest money maker their club had to support the local and other communities. Another past president said it is a lot of hard work with chook and meat tray raffles.

We usually start the planning of the next year's event in October by going to the coordinators of the various car clubs and asking them if they would like to attend this event. If so, can they go to their committee and ask for financial support to purchase prizes for our multi prize raffle. We thank the Brisbane register of the Jaguar Drivers Club who have for many years financially supported us, covering the costs of the essential portable toilets and raffle prizes.

As always, we ask that those attending and other members never disclose the address where this event is held or the date, as the general public are not invited to this event. We also request that attending members do not show photos they have been provided on social media.

We have already created a monster and do not need to have to defend the gate to keep this event progressing as an exclusive gathering of like minded people wishing to enjoy



1952 MG TF saves 1955 Jaguar XK140





JDCQ Mk2 Burblings with Robin Todd

Continuing my browsing of the internet I found two attention grabbing bits of info, in Shannons Spring Auction 2021 was a very nice black Jaguar 3.8 auto Mk2 and in the Torque section of the Tasmanian Jaguar Drivers Club an article about converting the Mk2 to a rack and pinion system and some of the problems therein.

The article about converting a Mk2 to rack and pinion steering was particularly interesting because of the detail and research. I have often read articles about such a conversion especially if it enables the fitting of power steering, however all seem to advise that such a conversion leads to various amounts of "bump steer". A story out of [I think West Australia] says that that geometry can be changed/adjusted to eliminate the bump steer but the result is more suited to a race track than normal driving.

The Tasmanian article talks a lot about the measurements necessary to be taken and the available space to fit the rack and subsequent components and the analysis of these possibilities. All I have read before talks about the fitting of the rack and pinion from an XJ6 which is I suppose about what you would expect but this article ends up suggesting that the rack and pinion from various Holden Commodores is more suitable in length and does not need to be shortened. Anyway our man details all his machinations and comes up with a satisfactory solution. I was particularly taken by his comments that even with the rack and pinion faults the steering is no worse than the bump steer inherent in the standard system. He believes he has come up with a good arrangement that considerably enhances the drive-ability of the car.

The relationship to the car in the Shannons auction is that when viewing the under car photographs they clearly show the bracket/plate used to fit the rack and pinion steering to the car. Sometimes these types of modifications can end up with a sort of "Heath Robinson" look but these look very professionable and I suspect someone is or should be marketing the plate/bracket.

All of this poses an interesting question - "Would you be penalised in a concour for having fitted a rack and pinion steering conversion when the judge can't see the bracketery from above and we now do not judge from underneath? - or don't we care any-more?.

Our "Country Luncheon" plans for this year have been only slightly less chaotic than last year with all the Covid concerns so unfortunately we had a number of cancellations but we are hopeful of a bigger and better year in 2022. A typical mess was our September event. Leyburn Sprints are usually held in August but because of Covid were deferred to September after we had all submitted our entries. Firstly the borders were closed so the interstate entries had to withdraw then Queensland Government imposed restrictions on sporting events except for the Holy Grail of Rugby League, so the event was postponed until September. The organisers did a magnificent job of offering refunds to those who wished or had to withdraw and allowing new entries to fill the starting

list in all a really wonderful job, but I will bet that there were some long long nights. Given that I had 2 years + I month to get ready I had plenty of time to formulate the perfect plan. Over the last couple of times we just got the car out, gave it a wash, checked all fluids, put her on charge then start her up for a couple of short bursts up the driveway [it's only a short driveway but we can easily run to 6000rpm in First gear before testing the brakes - You see that tests the misfire that has hounded the car for years has gone - we know not where but convince ourselves that all is now well and that the brakes are ok] a quick wash and put her on the trailer. This year we planned much more activity including fuel and electrical remove all brake drums to clean out all dust, rough up the linings etc, in all give her a real good preparation. Most of these things I was going to do at my leisure and then Cameron was going to come up for a couple of weekends and help with the whatever was left. When all this was about to start I contacted a severe bout of that dreaded disease lethargy which put a stop to all activity that could be described as work.. Needless to say most of the preparation work fell to Cameron who did a most enthusiastic job. Of course as usual there were last minute delays. The brake light switch is in the brake line and has an aversion to the silicon brake fluid we use so it as you would expect when we were under pressure failed. Now I'm not really sure why the brake light is essential in a single car event but better brains than mine have decided that so and therefore it must work. I have always got my replacements from a truck parts place but it takes a week to 10 days. I looked it up on the internet and found it was a Lucas part used by many makes. A quick trip in to Repco and as usual no they had never seen anything like that. We got the same answer from three of the shop assistants and then I said are you sure because it is actually a common Lucas part. One bloke thumped or was it placed a parts book on the counter and said see if you can find it for yourself. A couple of minutes later we said "it is one of those" to which was the reply "Oh them, we have them in stock"

Anyway somehow we got the car ready and finally took it out to Leyburn about 4.00pm on the Friday. We unloaded and headed back home to find that Cameron had arrived from Brisbane. He and I went out early on Saturday morning and with nobody else in Scrutineering we were through in no time except a head scruitineer who I think was Frank Lownes [father of Craig] decided to take me to task for not been on Targeted Scrutineering. We didn't argue it was just his chance to be a bit superior in front of the other workers and anyway we got back in time to get ready for the first run.

The rest of the weekend went well except one run on Sunday when the bolt holding the float bowl to the carby broke but with a bit of determination and successful scrounging Cameron got it back together and said it ran better than before however that might have been because he secured completely one of the leads to the coil which was just hanging on by hope and luck.. It may have been knocked loose by all the frantic work going on in the engine bay but if it ran better that is all that matters.

A couple of weekends later we went out to Morgan Park to see the delayed from July Historic. Numbers were a bit down but that was because of the border shut down. We packed up some food and drinks [non alcoholic] and drove down to a nice little spot down in the braking area for I think it is called One Tree Corner where we had a nice view. We usually watch from a spot just after they come under the bridge but didn't see any good spots. We especially liked the "JDCQ Past "Presidents Race" at least that is what we called it when the starting list included Graham Hine, Cortina, John T BMW and Peter Walsh Mini. Graham past over the driving to son Cameron for the races and then concentrated on the Regularity events which he won. Cameron won the Under 2 litre touring car event. The photos show that Cameron won the front wheel lifting contest getting the inside front wheel well into the air while Graham did a modest little lift. John T's BMW sounded really well and was well in front of the other BM while Peter seemed to be busy playing with someone or other.

That's about it for now so keep well one and all and if we don't see you in 2021 hope to see you one and all sometime in 2022.

NUTS AND BOLTS 2021 By Bill McMonagle

There has been only a small bit of Jaguar fettling going on at my place as I have been interrupted by a few other things which included eldest son Scott visiting from the NT in a 92 model Toyota Landcruiser Ute needing some serious attention in the brakes and a few other areas plus a bit of fencing when a major 10-inch (25 cm) gate post failed.

X300 interior door handle failure

The driver's side front interior door handle failed. It turns out that this handle drives a cable which connects to the door lock mechanism. One would think "oh I will just get some new cable" but that is not the case as it is a fairly complex system which incorporates a swagged Z end and a swagged ball at the other end with a sliding fitting which connects to the door lock. I opted to buy a whole new cable system which comes complete with a new interior handle from Aaron Goldman at Classic and Prestige in Geebung.

That is where the fun started as it was extremely difficult to get the sliding fitting on the cable at the lock end to go where it should fit. It actually has to go in behind the door lock mechanism and you can't see what you are doing. In desperation I googled the internet but it wasn't too helpful as most seemed to be fixated on removing the whole door lock to achieve this task.

So, I reverted to the old aviation trick of using a torch and a mirror to get a good look at the rear of the lock. Finally working out how it should connect, I managed to get the sliding fitting in place. If you ever have to do this task, remember do not mount the handle end first as you need some flexibility in the system.

"Barn finds" are still popping up

A friend who is a retired mechanic living just down the road has just acquired a MK7 Jaguar. It has been in dry storage since 1967! The body is not rusty but has been painted in some awful colour halfway between red and brown. In addition, somebody has bogged up the scuttle air intake and the side air intake flaps which are foot operated.

He thought the engine may have been seized however after soaking the bores for a week or so it finally allowed itself to be turned. Another friend brought in his borescope and the cylinders were minutely inspected and showed no signs of rust or damage.

Finally, power was put on the starter motor and it turned over but with the most horrible sound coming from the starter. The starter motor was removed and although it looked like the same Lucas starter the engaging gear on it was nothing like a Jaguar. We had a bit of a scrounge around in the shed at the end of my stables and unearthed a Jaguar starter motor gear which was fitted and the MK7 engine now turns freely. We have yet to try any fuel and spark.

Overall, this MK7 in an otherwise unmolested state is a good candidate for restoration. All of the chrome is good which is typical of these early fifties' cars, The interior wood work is all there and has not been sanded by anyone so it should restore nicely. Unfortunately, time has not helped the leather seats in this 67-year-old car and they will need to be re-upholstered.

One thing I noted missing is the Lucas DR1 windscreen wiper motor. If anyone can give me a lead on the whereabouts of a replacement it would be appreciated.

Toyota fettling

One problem in sons Toyota was the temperature gauge was not working. Now when it comes to building houses and similar work, he is known to do excellent work but when confronted by vehicle problems he is literally all at sea. Definitely not a chip off the old block!



It was easy to see why the temperature gauge was not working as both wires had broken off the two-pin plug that connects onto the transmitter on the engine block. I had a go at soldering new wires onto the plug but was unsuccessful. He tried to buy a new plug with wires attached but the one he got was not correct. At this point I checked via google to find that particular gauge was used by several Japanese manufacturers up to about the year 2000. You can still buy a brand-new transmitter but not the connecting plug. So, the easy way out was to snaffle one from a wrecker.

I approached local wreckers in the Strathpine and Brendale area looking for a replacement but none could help me. As one wrecker explained the big money is in "vehicles up to 10 or 12 years old" and after that they are mainly sold to the "scrappers" i.e., scrap metal dealers. However, one suggested I go to Kelly's wrecking yard in Zillmere as they are known to keep a lot of older cars on hand.

Kelly's were very good and allowed me access into their yard and also offered me a loan of a pair of side cutters which I declined as I was carrying my own. After wandering around this immense yard for a quarter of an hour I finally located where the Toyotas were hiding (I should have asked for directions). I finally found a suitable plug on a 2000 model Camry and secured it along with a couple of feet of wiring. When I went to pay for it Kelly's said you can have it for free. Very obliging and I thanked them sincerely.

It was only a few minutes of work to splice in the "new" plug and lo and behold, a working temperature gauge.

We then attacked the rear brakes. Apparently, the hand brake had not worked for years. In addition, the drum brake shoes were getting pretty thin and the hydraulic wheel cylinders were rusty and suspect. A new handbrake cable and rear brake kit which included new shoes and wheel cylinders were purchased from "Online Auto Parts" in Virginia for a very reasonable price. My son was very worried about the complexity of the brake system but I assured him it was pretty simple

compared to some I have handled and it actually came apart and went back together quite easily.

I also persuaded him to strip out the cabin as it was a disaster area and found literally ½ inch (12mm) of red dirt under the floor mats. It is now much cleaner and neater but won't win any concourse events.

Free MK2 parts.

The widow of Jack Smiley got in touch with the JDCQ offering some MK2 parts for free to persons who are restoring MK2s. I was asked by Lloyd Andersen via Joy Cooper in my position as a monocoque leader to help in disposal of the following parts.

Engine bonnet in good order but does have a hold down fitted as for racing.

Front and rear bumper bars. Rear bar has light rust but the front one is good. Both are straight

A complete set of chrome window guides which fit onto the doors.

ALH rear door shell with no fittings.

A Rear boot lid

Two front doors (L&R) which are extremely rusted in the bottom frame and skin. I am in the process of removing the door handles which were requested by a club member who is well into a restoration.

A front grille in good order.

These parts are now in storage at my place and will be given away to bonafide MK2 restorers. You can contact me on 0418 647 981 or 3882 0903


