

For Members who are heading to the Barossa Rally I wish you safe travels and I am sure you will have a great drive and a wonderful Rally.



The story of the man who fuelled America's love affair with Europe's finest auto marques.

Max Hoffman never worked for Alfa Romeo, BMW, Fiat, Jaguar, Mercedes-Benz, Porsche, or any other car company. NUTS AND BOLTS 2023 By Bill McMonagle

Fuel leaks

Doing some serious work on the carbies of my Mk1 as I chased a couple of fuel leaks led to having to replace the diaphragms in the SU HD6 carbies. In addition, I had to sort out why I was having the odd overflow of the float chambers.

I am not using SU pumps as in my now over fifty years of Jaguaring they have been the greatest failure point rivalling or even bettering Lucas electrics for breaking down. However, I was getting suspicious of the aftermarket pumps output pressure. The SU carburettor is only rated to a maximum fuel pressure of 3.5 PSI (pounds per square inch).

I dug around in my bits and pieces and unearthed an ancient oil pressure gauge. I did a quick check with compressed air and proved that the gauge was working and in reasonable tolerance. I then connected the gauge to the output of the pump and got a reading of approximately 5 to 6 PSI which is way over the tolerance of the SU carby float.

I then found a fuel pressure regulator via the internet which cost \$33. I presume it is made in China (like most things), fitted it to the pump outlet and set it for 2.5 PSI. I checked it again and that was the pressure being delivered. The SU carbies are now happy on the lower pressure reading.

This MK1 never had the proper fuel filter bowl system when I first acquired it and I had incorporated an inline filter prior to the carbies. The one that was fitted looked a bit tatty and I decided to replace it. Off to Supercheap in Lawnton which is my nearest motor trade outlet and plucked one off the shelf cost \$5.50. At the checkout I was asked if I was a supercheap club member. Yes, I was. As a "special" club members were getting 20% off so that dropped the price to \$4.40. Wow! Then they said "you have a credit of \$3.80 in your account (where did that come from?) so you have to pay 60 cents". I produced a one dollar coin got my 40 cents change and left scratching my head.

MK1 door handles

I had been digging around in my boxes of spares and trying to get some sort of order out of the chaos of numerous boxes etc. I realised that I had a number of MK1 door handles in various states of disrepair. The lock/unlock function on these handles is supported on a diecast moulding and they are very prone to failure. MK1 door handle basic castings are all the same and the only differences are in the lock/unlock mechanism which can be removed with three screws. The front doors utilise a key system and the rear doors are locked by rotating the inside door handle to a lock position.

By picking and matching I was able to assemble one front handle with a key that also matched a glovebox lid and two rear handles. As I don't intend to take on anymore MK1 revivals/restorations I decided to put them up for sale on Gumtree. Youngest son happened to be visiting from Melbourne and spied the handles in a shoebox and I told him what I was doing. "He said what the heck do you think you are doing because these handles have better chrome than those on the car". He was right!

So, I cancelled the Gumtree ad and kept the handles which have now been put on the MK1. But I already had an enquiry from a chap in Western Australia and I had to advise him that the ad was withdrawn but I could help him out with locking mechanisms. He advised that his locks were OK but the chrome was pretty bad and no one in WA could or would touch them. I advised him that Wizard Chrome in Narangba where I had some MK2 handles re-chromed specialised in restoring diecast chrome but it would not be cheap as mine had cost \$80 each. He followed up on this lead and came back to me with profuse thanks.

One man's trash is another man's treasure.

That old saying has never been truer as I dispose of assorted bits and pieces which have been cluttering up the shelves and sheds for decades. I admit to a certain responsibility based on the "gunna do" principle of someday I am going to use that. Following are a few of the sales made through the internet mostly on Gumtree.

Solex 11/4 inch downdraft carbies off a 2.4 motor. Went off very quickly to a chap in Tasmania and he advised they are used on Series one Land Rovers.

Two inch SU carbie inlet plenum chamber went to a Canberra person who is restoring a 420. Apparently, he acquired the car in pieces and his plenum was missing.

A set of four 16 inch wire wheels which were passed on to me were tracked by part numbers to fit XK120/140s and ended up going to Sydney.

Other assorted bits and pieces have been sold or given away to club members. I would also advise you that there are a number of MK2 bits and pieces still at my place from the estate of a deceased club member which are going for **FREE**.

Two left hand rear doors requiring minor rust repairs.

One rear bumper bar with overriders.

Chrome window supports for LH front and rear and RH rear.

Engine bonnet with a hold down peg hole.

If you are chasing any MK1 and MK2 bits let me know and you never know what I will unearth.

THE PROBLEM WITH XJ6 FUEL TANKS

As the years go by fuel tanks can become troublesome as they start to fill up with accumulated sediment and rust.

Now an XJ6 has two separate tanks and it seems there are many XJ6 owners who have been using just one tank for years because the other one fails to deliver.

Cleaning out fuel tanks usually involves removing the offending tank which in an XJ6 is not so easy. Just getting the bottom cover off to get at the tank can be fraught with difficulty particularly as Jaguar in their wisdom decided to use Phillips head screws rather than bolts to hold it in place and that's just the first of the problems. It is not a job for the fainthearted.

Luckily however it is possible (and definitely a lot less less difficult) to clean out these tanks in situ. On the cars fitted with fuel injection (some of the late Series 2's and all Series 3s) the fuel pumps were located inside the fuel tank directly behind the rear wheel whereas in the earlier carburettor models that is where the sender is located and the pumps are in the boot.

In the later models the senders are located directly behind the tail lights. The description here refers to work on an earlier Series 2 car but as all the tanks were unaltered in shape (they are actually interchangeable) the same system should work with later models because with a hole at each end it should be even easier.

After removing the rear wheel you will find a round plate situated in the rear of the wheel arch (see

photo) which needs to be removed to access the sender. (Or in a later model the fuel pump).

Once you remove the sender (it is held in with a locking ring) you can see right into the tank and probably view the tattered remains of your filter and a whole pile of what looks like orange mud on the bottom. It's actually a mixture of sediment and rust particles which, when they get stirred up (which they certainly do) eventually clog up the filter and cut off the fuel supply.

In the bottom of the tank you will find a drain plug screwed into a larger brass plug which gives access to the filter (see photos). The filter should pull off the pipe but I make no promises. On my car one side required an attack with a hacksaw blade before it would move, the other side fell off.

You now need to make up some form of scraper long enough to reach all the accumulated muck and start dragging it towards the hole you now have in the bottom of the tank. At this point I must stress that once you start this job you have to see it through to the end and get rid of all the debris or you'll probably just make the situation worse.

After you have broken up the sediment with the rake the most effective and as it happens the most cost efficient way to get it out of the tank is to put in a few litres of water then use a garden hose or preferably an air hose to agitate it and get the sediment to mix with the water, then quickly unscrew the plug and dump it into a container. You will probably have

to do this several (make that many) times to completely clear the tank.


Don't worry about putting water in the tank because there was probably plenty in there to start with. Petrol is hygroscopic. (It absorbs moisture.) That's the reason the inside of your tank is so full of sludge and rust. NB: If you prefer you can use diesel to do this but you will need to find somewhere to dispose of 20 /30 litres of unusable diesel. DO NOT USE PETROL. One errant spark and you'll need a new garage.

Once you've scraped up all you can and are getting nothing but clear water coming out the job is almost done. Now get yourself a couple of large bottles of vinegar and pour them into the tank, add two or three tablespoons of bicarbonate of soda, agitate the mix and then let it sit for a while. This will neutralise the rust. Empty the tank, let it dry for a day or so, replace the filter (with a new one of course) and job done with minimal cost and effort.

At this point it would be advisable to change the paper filters and if possible add another disposable one in just before the carburettors. Incidentally the only tank filters that seem to be available don't fit without some modification. The diameter of the hole is smaller than the pickup pipe and at least for a Series 1 and 2 it has to be reamed out to fit. Don't know about a Series 3, maybe they have a smaller pipe diameter. Anyway do this simple fix and you'll have a steady petrol flow for another 40 odd years.


Welcoming 2023

Buying new and used

When viewing a car do so from all angles and at different distances let me tell you anything is going to look great from 8 feet away at 8 o'clock at night. View from the front of the car looking down to the back and vice versa look from the bottom up and top down take a torch with you. Don't be afraid of what the sellers thinking you're only protecting your own interests. He probably think your picky, but believe me that bargain you think you're

I was recently asked if I could look over a fellow members car so that I could identify any possible previous paint and body repairs. I thought that this would make for a good subject. Buying both a new and used vehicle can be an exciting time, but that excitement would be short lived if when getting the vehicle home and in time, discovering that the vehicle has had poor repairs.

> Body filler is easily identifiable with a fridge magnet. Even the best of repairs may have some small amounts of filler. That's not to say they're faulty, just evidence. It gives you the satisfaction in knowing it exists. Hastily performed repairs can often result in the vehicle being painted over body filler that has not fully cured. This has a tendency to pull the paint but also produce a halo around the age of the body filler so look for any tell-tale signs that show as edges under the paint.

> getting may very well prove to be very expensive in the long run,

but you need to be realistic too a 40 something car is not new.

I'm including new vehicles in this because don't assume that buying a new vehicle, is factory fresh accidents happen. Its important to realise that any repairs done to a new vehicle that do not outlive the warranty maybe subject to a rejection of a warranty claim. Obviously older vehicles could and have probably had some form of repair performed. That's okay but you would want something that is done properly rather than shoddy. So. unless you're completely familiar with the car and its owner, How can you tell? you can't totally rely on the integrity of the seller. Cars may have passed many hands in which case the owner would not be fully conversant with the vehicles complete history. It's up to you the buyer to do your homework and perform some careful observations in order to protect your interests. You can't even entirely rely on third parties either. I know of an instance in which a car was inspected, and on the report it had listed chassis dust, but failed to mention rust holes in the floor. Another instance, a brand-new Land Cruiser was discovered after the proud owner got home to have rats residing and feasting under the bonnet. So the dealer hadn't performed the mandatory pre inspections

Rust can or not be obvious. Rust in lower section of the front guards or sills may not be the only rust present. The inner panels which are not all that accessible may also be affected. Once again a magnet will help identify the presence of rust repairs in the likely spots that most jags seem to suffer.

There are many tell-tale signs of body and paint repairs. Even the best of repairs could Paint repairs can be relatively easy to spot as there are numerous tell-tale signs.




These include:

Let's start with panel gap and I use this term extremely lightly given the fact that older jags particular ones built by British Leland whereby uniform panel gap was probably non-existent. It certainly would

Miss matched colours, which can also include panels faded at different rates. Obviously a panel repainted will have faded less than the original colour.

apply to anything newer. Gaps should be even all the way round. Gaps around the doors should be even and should be equivalent to the doors on the other side, fuel filler caps, bumper alignment, tailgates or boot lids should all be even all the way round. paint removed from bolts indicate tampering. The subject of panel gap is largely subjective in that car manufacturers have often been criticised for poor panel alignment, and over the years have strived to improve in this area. Panel gap, however is not necessarily an indication of a repair, rear bumpers are often removed for the fitment of towbars given the time constraints, some technicians have, it's probable that alignment could require some adjustment.



car, and so may not be the subject of a repair. Generally dirt nibs in the paint as shown in the photo are a potential sign of repairs performed

Nuts, bolts and scrivets and any type of fasteners should all be the same, if a component is fastened then all those fasteners should be the same, if not, then further scrutiny maybe required. If you were inspecting a vehicle whereby a badge has been removed, incorrect location or crooked I'd suggest you start looking a little bit further for possible repairs. Pinstripes should all be the same not only colour but thickness. Back in the 90s you could recognise a car sold as a secondhand vehicle. Dealers fitted pinstripes decals boot lid spoilers and chrome wheel arch mouldings to every car. A good portion of the time those graphics were applied over some defect.

Glossy paint that fades to being dull, can indicate a blend area or if the paint is dull in certain spots, heavy scratch marks under the paint are all indications of poor repairs and a red flag. These defects indicate short cuts, and are likely require to be addressed

It's a fact of life that Australian cars will suffer stone chips that shiny bonnet that has craters in it, has more than likely been resprayed and not very well because the repairer has not taken the time to feather or fill the chips.

Having said all this you've got to be realistic. Obviously if buying a restoration project then none of this applies. For all other vehicles though, some knowledge of what to look for can help make an informed decision.

to attend the 2024 Daimler National Rally. Thanks to our hosts, helpers and all those who came along to enjoy a happy day.


Susan was happy to show our female members her exquisite sewing creations in anticipation of the arrival of her first grand-daughter. This is one lucky baby!

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
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
