

Up here on the Sunshine Coast we are trying to vary our events and this one was a little different.

A few of the cars met at Landsborough and convoyed down but quite a lot (read the people from the south of the Register) went straight to the Abbey Museum just east of Caboolture . We were pleased to welcome Neil and Jenny from Brisbane Register.



It is not only the displays and the chapel with its beautiful stained glass which are interesting; the story of its origins is too. Rev John Ward had shown a passion for history and an interest in collecting antiquities from his childhood. In 1929 he founded a utopian religious community at Hadley Abbey, near London, and established the Abbey Folk Park (1934-45), combining education with a new approach to museums. This had to close during WW2 and in 1945 the community with a lot of the artefacts from Abbey Folk Park including gifts from Queen Mary, moved to Cyprus where Ward died. The community moved to Australia in 1956 and finally settled on land near Caboolture in 1965. The present Museum was opened in 1986. The collection ranges from Prehistoric times through to the late Medieval Period in the UK but covers Asian history as well. The chapel has stained glass windows dating from the 12th century, some coming from Winchester Cathedral, to modern times. All this is in a semi- rural setting with beautiful gardens and even cows in the background.









Then we moved to the chapel for a most informative talk from volunteer Holly and finally to the Museum itself. We were also fortunate to have a lovely music from a 'medieval' lute player as we took in the exhibits.

A big 'thank you' to Susan and Lindsay for organizing such an interesting day.


Footnote- The Abbey Museum stages a Medieval Festival each year which is well worth checking out.

PAINT AND PANEL

Do you wash your Jaguar regularly ? If you you do, and not doing it right you could be killing the paintwork with kindness. Regardless of the the type of paint applied, all of them are subject to contamination. Road grime, insects, dust, bird droppings, industrial fallout, tree sap, sit on the surface and can imbed into it. If your road car is waxed and constantly exposed to the sun, these contaminants imbed in the wax and can act like sandpaper. Some, like bird droppings, tree sap and insects, can etch into car paint, including two pack paints, if left on the surface. If any of these are on the paintwork, they should be at least rinsed off as soon practicable. There are many aspects of car washing that can cause harm to your cars finish.



Incorrect washing techniques can push the contamination around causing scratching that eventually requires paint correction. The diagram is representative of a clear over base colour, but is equally applicable to solid colours such as white, red or British racing green.



The image here shows the kind of damage to car paint caused by poor washing techniques. Paint correction processes can rectify this and I'll also cover this topic in later articles. The trick is to minimise the damage and slow the process of scratching.

Firstly, the tools.

If you are lucky enough to own a pressure washer these can can be your best friend and the cars enemy. Generally these put out a minimum of 1400psi. That's more than enough

pressure to strip paint and decals off a car if you get too close. Never use a washer to clean your hands or feet as the pressure is more than sufficient to take off skin. Plastic components and resprays are particularly vulnerable. Certain makes and models are notorious for poor top coat adhesion to the primer. I have repaired many vehicles having paint stripped from the surface because of laziness. Pressure washers should be used at a distance and for water saving purposes. They should not be a substitute for elbow grease. Pressure washers are used in conjunction with snow cannons. These distribute car detergents as a foam that helps soften contaminants before washing.

A good practice is to use two buckets one for washing the body and one for the sills and wheels. A false bottom in the bucket helps keep your sponge or mitt from picking up the dirt in the bottom of the bucket and further being dragged over the paint surface.

Use a quality car detergent. There are many kinds some with waxes or ceramic additives these are not that important, but do no harm. Never use household detergents as these I will strip the polish off the car.

Use a quality sponge or micro fibre mitt, these help lift the dirt from the surface releasing them into the bucket whereby they fall below the false bottom. If you drop the sponge or mitt, make sure you wash them in a separate bucket and rinse thoroughly.

A chamois or microfibre towel to dry the surface lifts remaining contaminants and prevents water from being recontaminated by air born dusts settling down on the car. By removing the water droplets you eliminate water spotting.

Often overlooked is water quality. Hard water leaves a deposit of salt and all you do is replace one contaminate with another. The calcium deposits not only dry and cause salt build up but also leaves the car streaky or spotty. It is best to use an alternate supply of water.

Having the right tools and ingredients are nothing unless used in conjunction with good techniques.

As you have probably heard don't wash your car in the sun why? As water evaporates any remaining contaminants will be dragged over the surface by the chamois or towel. If this is not possible, keep the panel wet and wash one panel at a time.

Wash from the top down. Rinse the panel before drying.

And the best tip for last don't wash with a circular motion go length ways along the panels.

AUSTRALIAN COUNCIL of JAGUAR CLUBS (ACJC)

"Change is the law of life and those who look only to the past or present are certain to miss the future."- John F. Kennedy

The Australian Council of Jaguar Clubs (ACJC) was inaugurated in 1983 and has served us well for many years. The objectives of the ACJC were set out in the adopted constitution as follows:

- To be responsible for the annual Jaguar National Rally (JNR).
- To act as the focal point for the relationship between the Australian Clubs and Jaguar Land Rover Australia (JLRA)
- To provide a forum for the Australian Clubs to share ideas and information on significant common issues.
- To promote camaraderie between Jaguar enthusiasts.

A Jaguar National Rally Manual was produced to be used as a model for host clubs to ensure continuity between rallies. This worked very well and updates and changes were introduced as the rallies were fine tuned.

However, over the past 10 years or so changes have inevitably evolved that have affected the way the ACJC operates as it continued to seek to fulfil its primary objective of supporting the member clubs and in particular how JNRs and concours events were run. These changes can be summarised in the following:

- The general ages of club members has increased significantly with some clubs having difficulty finding adequate volunteers to organise and run a JNR and a concours event.
- The financial obligations have been of growing concern with some clubs finding it difficult or undesirable to hold a JNR or concours event for a range of reasons including the cost burden.
- Jaguar Land Rover Australia despite maintaining contact with the ACJC to keep us informed of new model releases and management changes eventually withdrew their financial support for JNR's completely. This placed a greater burden on ACJC finances and in turn on annual club affiliation fees. A burden that could not be sustained in the long term.

All the while the member clubs saw the value in the ongoing support and camaraderie that the interaction between Jaguar Clubs provided. It is this ongoing belief in the importance of promoting the Jaguar marque that has resulted in some emerging changes that preserves the initial intentions and objectives in a modified form.

Some clubs have decided to no longer host a JNR and others to not include a concours event as part of the JNR. At the same time host clubs have chosen to implement changes to the traditional JNR format to suit their club and to promote greater inclusion by the 4,000+ members of the Jaguar Clubs around Australia.



It became clear to the ACJC that Rally's must be totally selffunded. This principle alone forced some re-thinking of the format of future JNRs. It is also likely therefore that future JNRs will be held less frequently. It is clear that only the JDCA and JCCV will continue to include a concours event as part of a rally.

Given that the ACJC has no longer any real financial commitments it has been decided with agreement from all member clubs that there is no need for it to hold a bank account, to collect member fees, or to be an incorporated body (ACJC is incorporated in SA). In fact, an unincorporated forum provides much greater flexibility in terms of who is involved and the breadth and level of discussion. As a result the ACJC Incorporated body. The ACJC funds have been distributed to member clubs in accordance to the constitution and the bank account will be closed. The new entity will take the form of a President's Forum with similar objectives in mind as the original ACJC. Inc.

SUMMARY As members of Jaguar Clubs in Australia you can be assured that a national forum promoting camaraderie amongst Jaguar enthusiasts and promotion of the marque will still exist. It will continue to seek to meet the original objectives, with some minor changes evident. The new name will be, the Association of Jaguar Clubs (AJC). This Forum intends to meet three or four times a year via ZOOM. It will be attended by the Club Presidents (or their appointee) and the chairmanship will be rotated between the member clubs. It has been agreed that JDCSA would initiate the first meeting which is expected to be in June 2023.



F-Pace Wins Drive Car of the Year (Best Medium Luxury SUV)

The multi award-winning Jaguar F-PACE has once again been crowned with the prestigious 2023 Australian Drive Car of the Year, Best Medium Luxury SUV, for the second consecutive year. The judges found the F-PACE to be a standout in its class, and were taken with its ride quality and comfort, state-of-the-art technology and infotainment system.

With a refined line-up since its launch, the F-PACE is now available in five trim levels and a choice of three petrol engines and one diesel engine. All models now feature Jaguar's R-Dynamic styling enhancements. The judges tested the 2023 Jaguar F-PACE R-Dynamic SE P250, and found this luxury SUV to be "a perfect allrounder – packed with features, stylish, luxurious and enjoyable to drive."

The F-PACE's design was a standout for the judges, which they found to be "stylish, sophisticated, and unique on the outside, while the inside is classic and true to its pedigree". The breadth of standard features was highlighted, with 20-inch diamond-turned wheels with grey accents, a 13-speaker Meridian sound system, noise cancellation, heated front seats with memory function, premium cabin lighting, and animated (scrolling) indicators all part of the package.

Inside, the cabin's understated elegance, ample space and ergonomic design impressed, while the infotainment system was praised as "one of the best in its class". The 11.4-inch Pivi Pro touchscreen boasts Apple CarPlay, Android Auto, DAB+ radio, active noise-cancelling technology, and high-resolution graphics, and was noted as being intuitive and easy to use.





Well here we are back again after a bit of a Sabbatical, or was it Long Service Leave or maybe just a bit of a holiday. Anyway the brain is absolutely brimming over with great little bits of information that I known you desperately want to read about.

First things first. To those of you who have been trying to follow the venues for our 2023 "Country Luncheons" and becoming a wee bit confused here is the real story.

The April Luncheon was declared cancelled because we planned to be away in Canberra for a grandson's 21st Birthday, however those plans were changed and at the March luncheon at the Railway Hotel in Allora where a couple of new members were able to join us with their newly purchased Cream or was it Old English White Mk2, I only saw it in the distance through my dark sunnies. We were also joined by Ron and Leslie Rumble with Len and Joan Henderson. We haven't seen them for seemingly ages and ages. Len and Joan were amongst the first group of Jaguar Lovers to attend our original [Mk2 Register as it was known in those days] runs, which usually comprised a bit of a drive, a feed and a bit of a drive home again. My how things have changed - such creativity, the mind just spins. By the way Bill & Honor McMonagle and Barry & Kay Challenor are also still attending. Maybe some sort of Long Service Award is just about due. Wonder how long ago it was now, I think it could be 24 or maybe 25 years. Anyway, back to the topic. At lunch in Allora Valerie mentioned we were not going to go to Canberra now whereupon a couple of ladies from the long service group persuaded me to now schedule a lunch for that vacant date.

. Quick as a flash I chose the Crown Hotel in Maryvale. We had been past there recently and it has changed hands [a couple of times] and been refurbished since last visit. When we went for our usual preview lunch we found that it was not open on Wednesdays until 3.00pm which I assumed was a bit late for lunch.so we needed a place that I would trust on a phone call . The Bull and Barley was chosen mainly because it had change hands since I made the decision never to go there again. Went the day well, must have we didn't leave till past 4.00pm.

The Roadvale Hotel had been recommended as a good venue so we wandered along one Sunday and yes it was good, and yes it was crowded, it even had a vehicle museum nearby so that was definitely a goer until we found that they too had stopped doing lunches mid-week. Somebody told me it was because of a downturn in the economy but I think it was just to stuff me about.

There was to be a choice between the Wheatsheaf Hotel. East Greenmount and the Greenmount Hotel Greenmount, however that resolved itself when we found the Wheatsheaf [rather like that name and it apparently has a fair few counterparts in good old England] only does coffee and cake and that would not be adequate for our Steak Sandwich brigade [me].

This year we have three new venues to try. We have tried two of the three already and were very satisfied. The first one is the Marburg Hotel. Those who used to come on our runs to the Twilight Horse Races in Toowoomba would be very familiar with the Marburg as it is across the road from the antique shop that seemed to intrigue the ladies of the group so that we always had trouble getting them moving again. Going way back in history it was often a venue for a much needed rest break on the long trek back to Toowoomba from Brisbane in the days before divided roads and by-passes of the towns along the way. Another new one is "The Wild Grounds Cafe" situated on the road from Warwick to Killarney and although the address is sometimes given as Morgan Park it is on the afore mentioned road. Thanks to Tom [a lunch regular] who pointed out that I had given the place the wrong name. I guess I had slipped back to my childhood and got it confused with the wild wood of Kenneth Grahame and his masterpiece "Wind in the Willows". And if you think that there might be a hint for the Trivia Quiz at our November Christmas lunch then you are completely correct. That will teach me to try to do two things at the same time. The last one is the Dugandan Hotel, Dugandan which is just down the hill from Boonah. We have been there a few times in the past and found it very satisfactory. Thought to be Boonah's oldest pub building in some circles, the heritage of the Dugandan Hotel dates back to the 1880s when the building was first established by Carl Stumer. The Dugandan did not actually become a hotel until 1913 however, trading as a general store for its first few decades. The original hotel design included accommodation, a cellar, water tanks to ensure cool liquor as well as a kitchen and servants' rooms. Over the years the Dugie has survived natural disasters including the 2011 floods, as well as undergoing renovations including a new deck and beer garden called 'The Chook Yard'. Throughout it all the Dugie retains its traditional country pub charm and continues to entertain locals and visitors to the area, hopefully for another century to come! The Warwick Golf Club is making a welcome reappearance on the list after a period where they didn't want to serve lunch. It can't have changed all that much as when I made the booking the lady on the other end of the phone said she remembered me. Why she would think that could be another question for the Trivia Quiz

Was reading an article the other day in a magazine called, I think, Classic Jaguar anyway I pick it up whenever I go into town which means I often pick up a copy that I already have. But I digress. The article was about the real old days when motor racing organizers thought it would be clever to hold races for "stock" as in showroom standard motorcars. We in Australia tried that and it turned out to be how stock was stock. At least here the competitors tried to pretend that their car was stock standard even though all the other competitors had a "cheater". The article detailed the modifications to the two cars that came first and second at the race held at Brands Hatch. A 6 hour affair. The winning Jaguar Mk2 was fitted with 2 Inch SU carbs, a different cylinder head, 9:1 pistons and a large number of other refinements like removal of interior trim, including replacement seats, that I have been unable to find in any of the brochures I have managed to download from the internet. These days we justify the replacement of heavy standard seats with lightweight specialized race seats as a safety initiative. The Mk2 that came second was similarly modified but kept the standard SUs. The article concluded



with a performance comparison with a standard car and whilst the top speeds were generally similar there was a really significant difference in acceleration times. As the popular saying goes "It is what it is so stop worrying". Hope to see you soon Robin Todd

Sunday 26th February, 2023 by Tony Nelson A Day in the Country

With raging COVID and very wet weather, it took us three attempts to secure a day to create this event.

The seeds of this event were sown in June 2011 when Neil and Jenny Summerson invited the members of the then E-type Register to finish a morning drive at their Peak Crossing property and they provided brunch.

This all happened in the backyard behind the house.

Attending this Sunday 26th February, 2023 event were some of the members who attended the June 2011 event. Allen Hilless and Scott Ganim joined me on the drive and Joy and Barry Cooper and Lorraine and Lloyd Andersen met us at the Summerson property.

I also create Mid Week Drives for the Alfa Romeo Club and we were again in that year invited and enjoyed breakfast at the property.

Neil and Jenny have involved themselves in the Peak Crossing community with an association with the local Fassifern Valley Rotary Club. This little club fights way above its weight in the care for the community and surroundings.

Neil suggested if I would be interested in the coordination of car clubs we were involved in and inviting them to meet on the property with financial proceeds going to a good cause. Neil contacted the insurer of their property to see if he would have coverage for a group of around 220 vehicles and 400 people to meet and enjoy each other's company. His reply was a quote from The Castle, "You have got to be dreaming." Mentioning this at a Rotary meeting, he was advised if the proceeds of the day went to the Rotary Club, then their insurance would cover the event.

We agreed we would create an event where the general public were not invited and no prizes for the best car etc as each car owner had a passion for that car. Car Clubs welcomed this initiative and over the years we have had people attend with vehicles worth under \$1,000 to many millions of dollars to a very friendly group of car enthusiasts.

Keeping this event out of social media was hard to control and as well as asking attendees not to reveal the event date or address, it was also requested there was no social media. Even when pieces were done for club magazines the location and event date were never revealed.

Neil and I as a committee of two, regularly met to organise all that would be needed to support a gathering. Decisions were made at the meeting or email or telephone and thus a trusting relationship was built.

Neither of us is getting any younger and the coordination of this event, as it got larger, took a lot of our time. We both travel a lot and this hindered organisation. We found out that 220 vehicles and over 350 people was just not workable and thus we restricted the number of vehicles each club was allowed to bring.

Our multi prize raffle grew to a point that each club donated at least \$50 to each raffle prize so selling raffle tickets was easy, as each prize was well worthwhile winning. As we increased the donation each vehicle would make when entering the property, Neil and Jenny donated a Gate Prize. For the past two years Motorama have



donated a choice of one of two vehicles for a weekend as a gate prize, so you can see how the event grew larger.

The committee of the Brisbane Register of the Jaguar Drivers Club financially supported the cost of hiring the much necessary portable toilets and raffle prizes.



Club member Allan Hilles and his guitar tutor Richard Waterson volunteered their talents and entertained us for many years, for which we are truly thankful.

The Rotary meal machine just got better each year, Jenny Summerson and her volunteers worked tirelessly on coordinating the raffle prizes and sales and at the end of each event we would just slump into a chair after a great but tiring day.

We also reintroduced attendees to freshly made lamingtons to enjoy with a drink from the mobile coffee van or Rotary and Jenny Summerson supplied tea.

Over 11 years, through the generosity of the car clubs, local farmers donating lettuce, tomatoes, meat works donating quality steaks, Rotary members donating from their own pockets to pick up the shortfall of expenses, all funds made on the day go to a charity selected by Rotary. This year the charities are mental health and homelessness in the Scenic Rim.

Even in this last event, we had a member who forgot to bring a chair, so offered Neil a \$50 hire cost for a spare chair for the day.

Our efforts over the 11 years generated over \$90,000 being used by this rotary club to assist others in need. Although we had 170 vehicles registered on the day, we always expect 10% not to attend for various reasons. However, we can report with all the donations and donors wishing to remain anonymous, our taking from the day was \$8,500.

Memorable events:

The year when the charity was The Struggling Farmers was our largest amount donated. Rotary ensured that the money we made was not just handed out in cash to the farmers. so that the bottle shop was not the major benefactor. It was done by vouchers to the local butcher, baker, and independent grocery shops, so that the money actually stayed in the community and was not taken out by large corporate suppliers.

It was the only day in 11 years when it

attend gave us one of our largest takes over the years of the events. One exhibitor who regularly brings 3 vehicles to the event and is presently creating a car museum contacted me, apologised for not attending because of the rain, but also asked for banking details so he could donate the entry fee for his 3 vehicles. Another person on the day wanted \$50 in raffle tickets. A book of tickets cost \$10 and he was told there were just 2 books left. His reply was "I will take the two books friendly everyone was. and the rest is a donation"

I discussed how many more years we could keep creating this event over the last 12 months. We were in agreement that 2023, this year, was the last event of this size we would create.

After finally making this decision, we found Red Tape had finally caught up with us and we could not obtain affordable public liability insurance cover anymore, so our decision to finish events of this size was confirmed.



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


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
