On Friday 21 July members of the JDCQ SSC reg. joined with the BRHCC for their annual run to Warwick for the" Jumpers in July" festival. This event is becoming very popular and this year was again excellent.

The group left the BRHCC club rooms at 930 for our first stop at Kilcoy for a comfort stop then it was on to Esk for lunch. On the way to Esk we encountered members of the Brisbane register on a run. I was followed by a lovely red Mk. 5 for several miles and when at Esk several more drove past. After lunch the grope proceeded to the transport museum at Gatton and from there to Warwick. I left them at Esk as I was meeting my brother in Towoomba. We caught up with the BRHCC members at the Buckaroo Motel Warwick.

The Motel was fully booked with people attending the festival so is a reflection of just how popular this event is. Most of the grope met at the Warwick RSL for tea but because it also was fully booked my Susan and I had tea at the Warwick

Chinese restaurant with my brother and his wife. The buffet was outstanding and I strongly recommend it. Great value as well.

Saturday was an organized run to Tenterfield. We visited the tank traps which were part of the Brisbane defensive line in WW2 and other historic sites in the area. Susan bought some art work at the Tenterfield art gallery then it was back to Warwick to get into some warm clothing for the next event. At 330 the group left for Killarney. Each year



the locals save up their scrap wood for a huge bonfire. This year was no exception. They also have steel structures of all shapes, Dragons, Castles, Frill lizards you name it. All spouting fire and looking fantastic. Kids and adults all having fun. There were food and craft stalls along with live music and even a pipe band. Shure must have been cold under those kilts. The evening was capped off with a huge fireworks display.

Sunday was the car display in the main street. We met at Queens Park where the various categories of cars were sorted before proceeding to the main street for display. Most were the usual collection of Holden's and Falcons but before leaving Queens Park I managed to arrange a 1930 Cadillac V 16 to join my brother and I.

The cars were organized into 2 lines both sides of the Warwick main street.



When parking the organizers had me leave a long space in front of the Daimler. The same for my brothers 1927 Hudson and also the Cadillac. The reason for this soon became obvious as those 3 cars became the centre of attention. The Cadillac had been the U.S. Ambassador's car in London 1930 to 1946. The Hudson had belonged to a prominent Sydney surgeon and also had been used as the getaway car in the great 1928 Commonwealth Bank robbery in Pitt



St. Sydney. The car still has a bullet hole in the rear window. My 1934 Daimler was used in the coronation of King George IV in 1937.

As well as the car display there were live bands and other entertainment. All the trees and poles along the main street were decorated with woolen jumpers and other art work. The Southern Downs Steam Railway were running their steam locomotive and train and from what I heard was fully booked. Every restaurant in the area also had a full day so I think the local businesses did well. Sunday night was another great meal so I may have to fast for a week to make up for the weekend away.

Speaking to one of the organizers of the car display, the manager of the Buckaroo Motel said they already have 8 bookings for next year. So, if you intend attending I would recommend booking early.

Monday it was time to return home to the Sunshine coast via Toowoomba. I had left

some tires there and had arranged for them to be fitted. That turned out to be a rather protracted event which I will save for another story.
